2. A team or horse may draw in one class only.
3. A teamster is allowed two helpers if he so desires.
4. No interference whatsoever by the helpers while horses are drawing, or draw disqualified. Teamsters or helpers are not allowed at horses heads while hitching or drawing.
5. No cursing, swinging lines, beating horses with ends of lines while hitched or drawing.
6. Teamsters and helpers are to stay behind whiffletrees while horses are drawing.
7. Teamsters and helpers are not allowed to touch, push or slap horses with hands.
8. No check slaps allowed.
9. In case of break in harness, time to repair determined by the Judge.
10. Two complete draws of 15 feet required. There will be 2 tries to pull the load 15 feet. The horses while pulling, must stay within the course lines or be disqualified from that try only.
11. Any movement under 4 inches will be considered a chuck if the teamster is trying to hold team and this will not be considered a pull.
12. Two passes in front of the boat will constitute one try.
13. Teamster, upon entering the pull area has 2 minutes to hitch and 4 minutes to complete pull.
14. Any teamster or helper arguing with the judge will automatically be ejected from contest.
15. Once a team has a draw, that teamster remain teamster for balance of the contest.
16. ALL PULLERS MUST SHOW PROOF OF INSURANCE.
17. All teamsters and helpers must be properly dressed for the occasion.
18. All decisions made by the judge are final.
19. Entries must be pre-registered \& membership paid before participating in the pull.
20. Prize money will be FORFEITED if puller not registered before entering the competition.
21. Any team considered dangerous by the judge /pull committee will be disqualified.
22. Once the team enters the pulling area for the first pull, and if they have blinders on, they must remain on, and if they are open, they must stay that way.

Best Teamster from Heavy Horse - plaque In Memory of Lorne Elder

1. No alcoholic beverages, prods or electrical devices used by teamster, helpers or officials
2. All teams subject to a drug test.
3. All teamsters/representatives and owners must be a paid-up member of OVHDA. A horse or team can only draw in one class and must complete 2 draws to collect hitch money if paid.
4. All teams weighed day of the draw with halter and loose shank.
5. Each teamster must pull to the end with no quitting and will takel fair hitch on their last load. If teamster or rep chooses to quit, it must be declared before they start loading the boat for the next round. If not done and he refuses to pull on the last load, he will forfeit prize money.
6. A teamster/representative is allowed to enter and drive more than 1 team per class and will draw for their pulling order prior to the beginning of the contest.
7. When a team enters the pulling area with or without blinders, they must stay that way for the duration of the contest. Adjustments to blinders during the pull are not allowed.
8. A) Length of a draw is 15 feet and a total of 5 minutes is allowed to complete 2 draws. The stone boat is to be drawn one way only however, can be drawn both ways for several rounds if deemed safe by the judge and Fair Board committee. Side lines are to be 18 feet apart. If the boat is within 36 ' from the side lines the next contestant can request to have the boat centered. B) When it is a distance pull - teams will be allowed 2 attempts to pull the boat 15 feet in one try. Their second attempt can be taken where the boat is or back to the start line if the boat has already been spotted.
9.. If there is a break in harness the teamster/representative he has the option to keep that distance or start over. If he chooses to start over, the boat will be placed at the start of the course. Time to repair and break in harness will be determined by the Judge.
9. All teams to remain stationary in the holding area until winners are determined. It is the responsibility of the teamster/representative to ensure their horses are attended to at all times.
10. A teamster/representative is allowed 2 helpers and they must remain behind the leading edge of the whiffletrees while horses are drawing. After completing the first draw there will be no change of teamster/representative except in the case of injury.
11. Teamster disqualified if slashing team with lines, profanity or abuse of horses.
12. Team unmanageable or dangerous to the public, disqualified and drug testing may apply.
13. Pulling order drawn prior to start. Horse pulls in one class only per competition
14. All teamsters/owners shall have proof of current liability insurance for horse pulling in the amount of $\$ 2,000,000.00$
15. Prize money FORFEITED if puller not registered before the competition begins!

3. Roseneath Fair Gate Admission: $\$ 10.00$ Daily for everyone 13 and over entering the Fairgrounds. This includes all exhibitors. Children 12 and under are FREE. $\$ 15.00$ for a Two Days Pass is for Saturday and Sunday ONLY for everyone 13 and over entering the Fairgrounds. This includes all exhibitors. Children 12 and are FREE. Parking is FREE.
4. All exhibits for competition in Classes $34-62$, can be labeled and placed in exhibit halls on Thursday from $7-9 \mathrm{pm}$. All exhibits for competition must be on the grounds by 10:30 a.m. Friday. All labeling and appropriate ate placement of these exhibits must be completed by 12 pm Friday
5. Entries and doors Close Promptly at 12 Noon on Friday for judging to commence in Classes $34-62$.
6. No exhibits will be removed from exhibit halls until SUNDAY 4:30 pm
7. All grains, roots and fruits to be grown in current year.
8. In Classes $34-62$ ONLY one exhibit per section of a class is allowed unless otherwise stated. This included Specials. Therefore, no one person will be allowed to enter for competition more than one specimen, of any variety, in any one section of a class which includes grain, vegetable produce, fruit or manufactured articles.
9. The directors will use every reasonable precaution to ensure the safety of articles on exhibition, but will not be responsible or make payment for the value of any exhibit that may be in any way lost or damaged.
10. The Treasurer will mail the prize money to those whom it may have been awarded. If due to inclement weather or for any other reason, receipts prove insufficient to meet all expenses, the directors reserve the right to deduct a percentage from all prize monies.
11. Otherwise, NO MONIES WILL BE WITHHELD FROM WINNINGS. However; any prize money totaling $\$ 1.00$ or less will not be paid.
12. All complaints must be written and in the hands of the Secretary not later than October 12 and accompanied by a $\$ 10.00$ deposit which will be forfeited if protest is lost.
13. All cheques issued in payment of prize winnings must be cashed by Dec. 31 of the same year or the exhibitor may forfeit the right to any prize money.
14. All prize winners are required to send a list of prizes won by them to the Secretary not later than October $12^{\text {th }}$
15. Judge's Note: The judge may retain any prize on any animal or article if they deem it not worthy. In the absence of competition in any section or if the entry be of inferior quality, judges must award only such prizes as they deem the entry worthy of.
16. Ponies are not eligible to show in Light Horse Classes.
17. Judges of the home craft work are authorized by the directors of the Society to disqualify all soiled, defaced or old work and are instructed to award prizes to the new and up-to-date work. Unless the exhibit is worthy the prize will be withheld.
18. Any exhibitor or attendant who is guilty of creating a disturbance, whether by openly criticizing the judge, or using obscene language to any judge or officer, shall therefore forfeit the right to any premium and may also be suspended by the Society from exhibiting. No one except judges will be allowed to touch, taste or handle any exhibit.
19. The Society will not be responsible for any loss, damage or accident to any person or property on the grounds used during the annual Roseneath Fair. All persons using the said grounds do so at their own risk.
20. Directors or judges reserve the right to alter said programs in any way should the need arise.
21. All livestock exhibitors must carry $\$ 2$ million liability insurance coverage, sign bottom of entry form with company, broker name and policy number.
22. Errors. The Society will not be responsible for any errors, printing or otherwise in this Prize List Book. In case of error, directors have the power to rectify same.
23. Except where stated, all entries must be made or grown by the bona-fide owner of the exhibit.
24. The Society will not be held responsible for the sale of any food during the annual Roseneath Fair. All persons purchasing any food products do so at their own risk.
25. When an exhibitor signs the entry form, the exhibitor shall indemnify and hold harmless the Roseneath Agricultural Society, their members, agents and employees from and against all claims, demands, losses, costs, damages, actions, suits and proceedings by any third parties that may arise out of, or may attribute to, all operations performed by or carried out by the exhibitor, his agents, employees, servants, or any one for whose acts he may be held liable, howsoever caused.
26. All tents must be fire rated.
27. Tents or booths for the sale of intoxicating liquors, all kinds of gambling or money bank performances are prohibited.
28. Privacy Policy. Any information collected by the Roseneath Agricultural Society regarding members, exhibitors, commercial exhibitors, sponsors, directors and any other persons related directly to the business of the Roseneath Agricultural Society and the Roseneath Fair, will be solely used for the purposes of promotion of the Roseneath Agricultural Society and the Roseneath Fair; for processing payment of prize monies and other payments owed; for publication of the winner's names in local papers; and for maintenance of their files and data base. Any member, exhibitor commercial exhibitor, sponsor or director realizes that when they agree to take part in the Roseneath Agricultural Society and the Roseneath Fair, that their names may be published for these reasons only. None of this information whatsoever will be sold or transferred to any outside party for any reason.
29. The Society will not hold themselves responsible for any accident that may occur on the grounds during the Fair. During this time of Sports and Races, rigs not entered are positively forbidden to be driven on the grounds under penalty. However, motorized wheel chairs and scooters are allowed on the grounds.
30. No livestock (dairy or beef cattle, sheep, bison or pigs) shall be allowed entry to the fairgrounds unless they possess the approved (intact and undamaged CFIA tag or Pig TRACE identifier. They must leave immediately.
31. It is the responsibility of the owner and/or exhibitor of any livestock (dairy or beef cattle, sheep, bison) to ensure that EVERY animal under their care, have the required approved tag as per CFIA regulations BEFORE entering the Roseneath Fairgrounds.
32. It is the responsibility of the owner and/or exhibitor of pigs (and farmed wild boar NOTE: pot-bellied pigs can be microchipped) to ensure that EVERY animal under their care, have the required approved identifier as per Pig TRACE regulations BEFORE entering the Roseneath Fairgrounds.
33. If an Agricultural Society is required to provide a tag in the event that an animal loses their tag at the fair, then the owner or exhibitor is responsible for applying the tag and ensuring that it is done in a safe manner. Agricultural Society staff or volunteers MUST NOT apply or assist in applying the tag. Furthermore, the Agricultural Society is not responsible for providing the pliers or apply the tag or facilities to restrain the animal while the owner/exhibitor applies the tag.
